This Sunday, as we work our way through the book of Acts, I'll have the pleasure of speaking on one of my favorite passages, Luke's recounting of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, in Acts 2. Whenever I speak on this passage, I link it to Elijah's encounter with the Spirit, as recorded in I Kings 19. You remember the story: When Elijah fled from Jezebel, God led him to a cave on Mount Horeb and announced that he was about to pass by. There followed a mighty wind, but the Lord was not in the wind; then, an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; then, a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. Finally, there was a gentle whisper, and Elijah covered his face, recognizing that he was in the presence of the Almighty.



On the day of Pentecost, there was a sound like a violent wind along with tongues of fire. If we jump ahead to the outpouring of the Spirit in Acts 4, we see that the place where they were meeting shook – an earthquake. Following these outpourings, the disciples "began to speak ... as the Spirit enabled them," (Acts 2:4) and "spoke the Word of God boldly." (Acts 4:31). My point is simple: While the wind, fire and earthquake were evidence of that God was present, his presence itself is in the Word. When we hear someone say (or, when we ourselves say), "The Spirit of the Lord was present in that service!" our question must be, "Well, what did he say?" Sadly, we can be carried along by compelling worship and passionate messages, but unless there is a Word from God, we cannot say that we have fully engaged with him.

Being people of the Spirit means being people of the Word. To be clear, I'm not speaking only of the Bible. Speaking the Word boldly (and I hope to flesh this point out more deeply on Sunday) means speaking as God did, when he spoke light into existence, as Jesus did, when he spoke life into Lazarus' dead and decaying body, and as Peter and John did, when they spoke healing into the beggar's legs. But if we aspire to speak the Word in this way, we must first be filled – to overflowing – with it. Oh, that we were filled to the extent that Jeremiah was so that we could say, as he did, "his Word is in my heart like a fire, a fire shut up in my bones. I am weary of holding it in; indeed, I cannot." (Jeremiah 20:9)

For the one whom God has sent speaks the words of God, for God gives the Spirit without limit. (John 3:34)
